I BELIEVE...

I believe that no man should have power to take wealth he has not produced or earned unless freely given to him by the producer.

I believe that brotherhood requires giving an equivalent for every service received from a brother.

I believe it is blasphemous to assert or insinuate that God has condemned some of His children to hopeless poverty, and to the crimes, want, and misery resulting therefrom, and has, at the same time, awarded to others lives of ease and luxury, without labor.

I believe that involuntary poverty and involuntary idleness are unnatural, and are due to the denial by some of the right of others to use freely the gifts of God to all.

Since labor products are needed to sustain life, and since labor must be applied to land in order to produce, I believe that every child comes into life with divine permission to use land without the consent of any other child of God.

Where men congregate in organized society, land has a value apart from the value of things produced by labor; as population and industry increase, the value of land increases, but the value of labor products does not. That increase in land value is community-made value. Inasmuch as your power to labor is a gift of God, all the wealth produced by your labor is yours, and no man nor collection of men has a right to take any of it from you.

I believe the community-made value of land belongs to the community, just as wealth produced by you belongs to you.

THEREFORE....I believe that the fundamental evil, the great God-denying crime of society, is the iniquitous system under which men are permitted to put into their pockets, confiscate, in fact, the community-made values of land, while organized society confiscates for public purposes a part of the wealth created by individuals.

News In Our Time

Some time ago, in an Associated Dispatch from Washington, we read: "The Agricultural Department says it is ready, on a moment's notice, to start surplus potatoes, dried milk and dried eggs moving to accredited relief agencies under its new "give-away" program."

While some agencies could use this food, in an article by one of the Herald-Tribune's special writers (Dorothy Dunbar Bromly), we find a little later, this statement by Henry J. Rossner, Assistant to the Commissioner of the Department of Welfare: "The Department regrets it does not have the facilities to distribute locally to home relief clients the surplus potatoes, dried milk and eggs. The cost would be prohibitive if we were to rent local stores, break the hundred pound bags of potatoes into ten pound sacks and package the dried milk which comes in 180 lb. drums, and the eggs, which come in 14 lb. cartons".

George's Viewpoint as Good NOW as THEN!

VARYING HUMAN NATURE - UNVARYING NATURAL LAW (66ntinued from July issue)

As one who would learn more about the stars studies astronomy, so the man desirous of discovering more about the implication and intergration of natural laws at work in the metaphysical field applies himself to the science dealing with this subject, - that of political economy.

This is not the same as the study of morals or politics, though both of these branches of knowledge, George says, "throw a powerful light" on social phenomena. It is, instead, the discernment and application in the mental field, as revealed in history and daily observation, of the unremitting, irrepressible efforts of the human race to follow the line of least resistance in achieving the satisfaction of evergrowing desires, both material, and spiritual.

This men will do directly, (the easy way), if they can, but circuitously, (the hard way), if they must, in their incessant avtivities in making a living. Like wine fermenting in a bottle that will at length break the glass if the cork is not removed, social movements, held under unnatural pressure, work for the destruction, and not the welfare of its members.

Looked at in this light it is only logical to conclude that such practices as private ownership of the world's natural resources, upon which all must live, of trade restrictions that interfere with the self-regulating laws of supply and demand of goods and services, are measures to be tolerated only as temporary evils, both out of past ignorance and the moment's necessity, but to be deprecated and corrected as soon as possible.

In harmony with these beliefs Henry George wrote in Progress and Poverty: - "Man, as he advances, threads a labyrinth-----through which reason and justice alone can keep him continuously in an ascending path". And again: - "Shortsighted is the philosophy that counts on selfishness as the master motive of human action. It is blind to the facts of which the world is full.------Call it religion, patriotism, sympathy, the enthusiasm for humanity or the love of God, give it what name you will, there is yet a force which overcomes and drives out selfishness; a force which is the electricity of the moral universe."

It is the presence of this power that will some day bring to pass the association of all men in economic equality and freedom.

"YOU ARE ONE WITH THE UNIVERSE" (Concluded)

Nature offers material to men, and Man himself, is included in Nature, Our will is free. Himan will can only affect external nature by taking advantage of natural laws, which implies that there is a higher and more constant will. The human element is the initiative.

Nature, by the art of man, created a commonwealth or state, which is but an artificial man. Man makes laws because someone desired them. Congress can pass an act, but that doesn't make it right or just, even though it may be legal. And since man's will is free, he will break a legal law when it suits his fancy to do so. (Take speeding, excessive drinking, blackmarket).

Political Economy seeks those laws of the distribution of wealth which belong to the natural order, Laws which concern the Body Economic, the Greater Leviathan, which makes its appearance with civilization and develops with its advance.

Both production and distribution are continuous, they are not separate things, but two mentally distinguishable parts of one thing. The exertion of human labor for the satisfaction of human desires.

Both are laws of nature...Laws of Production are physical laws, and the Laws of Distribution are moral laws, involving ethics.

They are inter-related. Distribution is really the cause of production. Things are produced in order to be distributed. When production and distribution are interfered with it is a consequence of Natural Law, not human law.

Natural law is not seen in the physical law.

Natural laws cannot be violated. Man's mind and his actions through knowledge and cultural background will affect man's thought and actions. But since thought preceeds all wise, therefore, human laws are laws of nature.

Whether they are good or bad is of no concern to the law of nature, but their effect on man is of concern to him.

If natural law is violated there is a consequence. The laws of nature are not written in statute books, though human laws are.

Religion assumes that there is a power, or force, or ideal to which human life must be adjusted. The organized religion of today offtimes consists only of rituals and dogmas. Rather than jogmas of theology, religion should be compatible with science.

Political Economy isactually a psychoanalysis of history, cause, effect and result.

Philosophy presupposes existing knowledge with an interpretation and evaluation of this knowledge, and tries to analyze and clarify ideas and methods. Philosophy cannot create a faith. Its interpretation must be relevant to living experience.

History is an interpretation of a particular social culture. Considering it from the Politically Economic point of view, history is nothing more than the existing Political Economy of the day. And each economic development has its own place, since Economics is a psychology of historical events.

The union of scientific religion with the philosophy of correlating historical events will, under the proper conditions, ward off the "isms" that are penetrating our social order.

Teachers, doctors, ministers, students, businessmen, actors, lawyers, clerks, stenographers, secretaries, farmers, salesmen . . . individuals from all walks of life who have completed one or more of the basic and advanced courses at the Henry George School, its Extensions, or its Correspondence Courses.

ITS OFFICERS ARE

Members of the organization nominated and elected by the membership for a period of one year. They are guided by a Constitution; and all activities are conducted in a democratic, parliamentary procedure.

HISTORY

S. A. G. E. Inc. was formed in April of 1948 by a few people who felt that an Alumni group could do a great deal to advance the process of education in the George Economic Principles by (1) holding and maintaining the interest of graduates, (2) developing programs of action for those zealous individuals who sincerely want "to do something", (3) providing entertainment programs as social attractions and outlets and (4) encouraging cooperation among Georgist individuals and groups in a united effort toward a common goal. A Constitution and By-Laws were drawn up, membership solicitation was stepped up, organizational procedures were planned and programs were outlined.

The foundation for S. A. G. E. was well laid and the organizers entertained no illusions about the tremendous task that lies before all Georgists ere their principles are recognized by society generally. They knew, and still know, that the process of education is the first requisite to enlightenment and it must be steadily and increasingly expanded to encompass a good-sized minority within society before and decided reforms can be effected. They also felt that the educational process could be hastened by providing a unified vehicle of expression and action to those Georgists and graduates who believe that "in union there is strength" of purpose and solidity of influence and effect.

Cohesion of organizational efforts manifested themselves gradually as S. A. G. E. grew from a mere handful into hundreds. Much has been accomplished within our short existence and we have proven that we are a staying, influential, and demonstrable force which is destined to perform a great role in advancing the George principles of economic truth. S. A. G. E. became incorporated under New York State law in August 1949 as an education organization.
