FIELD ORGANIZER ADDED TO STAFF OF HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL

NEW YORK (HGNS) - A field organizer has been added to the regular staff of the Henry George School of Social Science. The Board of Trustees appointed Arthur W. Falvey to establish extension classes in the important cities starting from British Columbia, down into the State of Washington, through Portland, Oregon and into California, where the movement has numerous friends who are anxious to see classes opened and will help to get them organized, and thence he will move eastward to New York.

Prospect lists will be supplied from the National Headquarters in New York and Mr. Falvey will devote himself solely to forming classes and cooperating with prospective instructors. He has already put two key cities on the School map. He started the first two classes in Omaha which are now being conducted by graduates and he has just completed his first class in Seattle. His experience makes the trustees confident that he will meet with success in every city he tackles.

Other field organizers will be added as funds to make such expansion possible become available.

FORMER BROOKLYN POSTMASTER MADE GEORGIST BY DEBATE

BROOKLYN, N.Y. (HGNS) - Albert Firman, former postmaster of Brooklyn and friend of Henry George told the members of the N.Y. Chapter of the Henry George Fellowship at their meeting held in the Henry George School for Social Science, 211 West 79th Street, New York, on January 12, in an impromptu talk that he became convinced of the fundamental truths propounded by Henry George in preparing for a debate on the Single Tax in which he was to take the negative side. By the time he finished reading Progress and Poverty, he said, he knew that he was on the losing side. Since that time he has been advocating and working for the ideals that Henry George embodied in his social and political philosophy.
