DENMARK'S PROGRESS LAID TO GEORGIST PRINCIPLES IN TOWN MEETING

NEW YORK (HGNS) - What the partial application of the economic principles of Henry George has achieved in Denmark was described by Dr. Frederic C. Howe, former consumers' counsel in the Agricultural Adjustment Administration and now special adviser to the Secretary of Agriclture, in a nationwide broadcast, "America's Town Meeting of the Air". on January 21.

"They adopted the Henry George philosophy in part, for the purpose of breaking up the land so every man might have a home of his own," Dr. Howe said. "Today, only four out of every one hundred farmers in Denmark are tenants, as opposed to forty-nine farmers out of a hundred who are tenants today in America." His point aroused the audience at the Town Hall in New York, where the broadcast originated, to hearty

applause.

Dr. Howe, the author of "Denmark the Co-operative Way", the rewritten edition of his classic work on that country just published by Coward-McCann, told how the people of Denmark built up their cooperative movement, learning how to maintain and operate their own enterprises, how they entered local politics and finally national politics, so that today eight out of eleven members of the cabinet are of the Liberal Left, how they organized their own educational movement, cutting down illiteracy to three one-hundredths of one per cent, and how they finally set about the gradual application of Georgist principles.

MASS MEETINGS FIND LAND QUESTION AT CORE OF SPANISH REVOLUTION
BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINA (HGNS) - The economic conditions which
brought about the Spanish revolution were set forth publicly by Accion
Libertadora, Georgist organization, at recent mass meetings, Nueva
Argentina, Georgist monthly review, reports (xi.xxxvi).

Dr. Elias Melopulos opened the series with an address on "The Spanish Revolution and the Land Cuestion." At the next meeting Professor C. Villalobos Dominguez discussed "The Position of Georgism on the

Sp anish Revolution."

At another public meeting, Dr. Carlos Ma. Brian spoke upon "The Economic Ideas of the 'Men of May!", the popular movement which in May, 1810, liberated Argentina from the Spanish yoke, and prepared the way for the administration of Bernadino Rivadavia, anticipator of Henry George and Washington of Argentina.

Accion Libertadora (which means Liberating or Libertarian Action) is building up a special library on economics and finance and Georgists of Argentina are aiding by book donations. It now comprises 2,000 volumes. The organization is non-partisan with one aim: socialization of the rent of the land of Argentina.

ZIONISTS ADOPT GEORGIST LAND POLICY

NEW YORK (HGNS) - Philip S. Bernstein, Rabbi of Birith Kodesk Temple of Rochester, N.Y. and Chairman of the Committee on International leace, writing on the Promise of Zionism in the Nation of January 2, alls attention to the fact that the Histadrus, the General Federation Jewish Labor, today the dominant element in Palestine and World liminates exploitation and speculation. It has also established two types of collective farms. Because the land belongs to the Jewish people, they cannot sell it, nor may they "exploit" labor to work it for them.

The Jews today own less than ten percent of the land of Palestine and every inch of that was purchased, usually from absentee landlords at prices that made the sellers rich, said Mr. Bernstein. Most of this territory, being swampy and wasteland was unimhabited and considered uninhabitable until the Jews acquired it. In fact, the Hebrew term to describe such acquisition is "Gaulat Haaretz" -- not purchase but redemption.

CHILEAN ECONOMIST WAKES IMPORTANT CONTRIBUTION. TO GEORGIST LITERATURE BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINE (HGNS) - Jorge Gustavo Silva, special professor of labor economics at the University of Chile, a Georgist, has written a series of articles on The True Right of Property and Verital Slavery. The articles were published in Nueva Argentina, Georgist monthly review, and have been declared by Georgists an important contribution to the literature of the movement:

A survey in the February number of the Commentator, the first issue of a new magazine would indicate that exclusive of the Bible, only one book, "In His Steps" by Charles Munroe Sheldon, published in 1899, has exceeded the sale of Progress and Poverty.
