

SOME INTERESTING ECONOMIC FACTS

Between the years 1934 and 1948 the Depart ment of Agriculture supported price programs in the amount of \$10,370,500,000.001 Basing the dollar as 100 in 1939 the purchasing power of the dollar in January 1950 was 59.9. In October it declined to 57.2. Currently it is 51 and it will continue to decline as waxes and living costs increase.

Still based upon the 1939 dollar, the average real weekly earning as of October 1930 was \$35.46 for an average of 41.4 hours per week as compared to 23.56 for a 37.7 hour week in 1939.

In 1929 there were 596,000 civilian employees on the Federal payroll. At the end of June 1950, there were 2,022,000! As we go into a war economy, who knows what the figure will be? It would be interesting to know how many non-civilians there are, wouldn't it?

In 1939 the total Federal receipts from individual taxes amounted to \$1,029,000,000.00. In 1949 they amounted to \$18,725,000,000.00. Greater amounts are being legislated.

EAST AND WEST MEET

No longer can it be said that "East is East and West is West, but never the twain shall meet". Isolationism for any country is now a thing of the past and no matter how different the culture and mental approach, mutual understanding is vital to the preservation of all mankind.

With events happening so fast it is hard to know whether the general situation grows better or worse from day to day. What is certain is that scarcity and conflict will persist, in varying degrees in changing localities, so long as there are both idle acres and idle men, the outstanding injustice and basic source of trouble in all history.

While the West still has a much higher standard of living than that of the East, the entire world is now faced with inflationary prices and a diminishing quantity of peace-time production. Something warm to wear in Winter, a place to call home and a full rice bowl or loaf of bread must be provided for displaced starving millions.

There is, however, a widespread feeling in Asia, regardless of its destitution, that from whatever source relief comes - Marshall plan or any other - it is not acceptable if better conditions are to be secured only through the sacrifice of newly won autonomy. How far has America been able to make clear to the East that she has no designs on any of its territory and how far is this commendable policy actually supported by certain other nations now winning approval because of their promises for increased welfare?

The ardent desire to have a direct voice in the settlement of their own internal affairs was made evident during the Fall of last year when an International Conference of representatives of some sixteen nations under the auspices of the Institute of Pacific Relations was held at Lucknow, India.

As repoted in the press, many of the Western delegates were surprised and nonplussed, particularly those from America, by the hostil critical cisms voiced by Eastern members of the Conference of both the United States and other powers on this side of the globe. An article in the New York Times declares; "Having only recently been freed from one kind of imperialism, Asians fear another kind - economic imperialism. What is the use of political independence, they argue, if we are not economically free."
