VIEWS EXPRESSED IN THE NATION MAKE WEINBERGER 'TIRED'

New York, (HGNS) -- Carrying out a theory of his own "when you see a head that ought to have some brains in it throw a Single Tax baseball at it and insist on the head either being hit or dodging the issue," - Harry Weinberger, New York attorney, Georgist, and free-speech advocate has written to the editor of The Nation expressing dissatisfaction with the editorial policy of that weekly.

"I have just renewed my subscription, but from an economic point of view the Nation makes me 'tired'", Mr. Weinberger said. "On literature, drama, liberty, peace, and other questions the Nation is interesting and well informed, but on economics it seems to tongue-tied, deaf, and blind."

"Of all the solutions proposed to bring us out of the depression, create more jobs, open opportunity, and solve the slum question, apparently the Nation has never heard of the Single Tax," Mr. Weinberger continued. "'The unearned increment of land' is a phrase almost never mentioned in their pages."

"That which the community creates should be taken for community purposes by taxation", he continued. It can be done by taking yearly the full rental value of land without considering the improvement. This plan should appeal to your sense of justice, and is a simple way out of the depression."

CARROLL SCORES GOVERNMENT FAILURE TO COLLECT LAND VALUE

Waterbury, Conn., (HGNS) -- In a letter to the editor of the Waterbury Republican which was printed in that paper on May 21, Joseph R. Carroll of the Single Tax League condemned the failure of the government to collect its own revenue from land value and expressed the belief that depressions are not due to any fault in the system of private enterprise is as mistaken as it is universal."

There is a natural fund for governmental expenses in land value, Mr. Carroll held, and for government not to collect its expenses from that fund is to bring about depressions and all their attendant evils.
