SPEAKERS BUREAU: -- WHY HESITIATE?

Those who would attempt to change Society must first reach the people. (But) Can the people be reached? Can they be aroused?

A sincere attempt is to be made by the Speakers Bureau, newly formed and sponsored by SACE. This Bureau will act much like the torch, in passing the fire from Henry George to the people.

This is not easy, for this noble motive entails a lot of work for success. Attempting to educate the masses, or even provoking thought among them, is a job for any organization. The new Speakers Bureau will have this to do and much more. It must help to form a more closely knit organization among all Georgists — it must be prepared at any time to supply a speaker on any phase of George economy, on any occasion and at any time. It must offer, or have access to, training in Georgist courses, Public Speaking, Writing, Dramatics, and more, so that this Bureau can grow in strength and effectiveness.

As soon as possible the Bureau will form sub-committees in the following general groups: (1) Public Speakers; (2) Professionals; (3) Secretaries; (4) Managers, & (5) Actors, - whose duties (and I should say, pleasure) will be as follows:

- (1) Public Speakers These speakers can designate their free nights and days that are available, to speak at meetings, on the radio and television, etc., for appointments to be made for them.
- (2) Professionals Who can give us an insight into their professions, so that we may gauge the temper of these groups and anticipate their demands, outlooks and questions.
- (3) Secretaries and Assistants to aid in the regular work of operating any Bureau, and more, to help each speaker (a) to gather his material; (b) to answer questions "on the spot"; (c) to circulate Henry George pamphlets and information, helping to win new friends and students for us.
- (4) Managers Hosts, Entertainers, Guides, etc., to serve as hosts to visitors to arrange for meetings with Henry George and other groups.
- (5) Actors and Playwrites, (professional as well as beginners), to lend power by drama, to present Henry George in the form most effective today.

The Speakers Bureau is organized to be the largest and most responsible group attached to the Henry George Philosophy. It needs an ARMY of Georgists, from every State in our nation, and from every nation in our world! - WHY HESITATE?

The following message was sent personally by the Chairman of the Education Committee to Washington on Bill HR-2859 (which provides for the sale of public lands of Alaska). If it's too warm to write one yourself, just sign your name to this and mail it out:

"I am opposed to selling Alaskan Public Land to private owners. It would be more beneficial to rent it to the individuals who desire to use it, for as the community grows it will accrue to thevalue of the land and the rent can be increased. The Government will have natural revenue exceeding what taxes on improvements could bring and the rent charged could not be shifted to those not owning land. This would also avoid land speculation and eliminate the himdrances to production".

EDUCATION (continued): - Bills up in Congress:

S-1858 (By Mr. McCarran) - A bill to permit the admission of alien spouses and minor children of citizen members of the United States armed forces; to the Committee on the Judiciary.

S-1912 (By Mr.0 Mahoney-by request) - A bill to provide for the classification of the public lands in Alaska; to the Committee on Interior & Insular Affairs. S-1971 (By Mr. Thomas of Oklahoma) - A bill to stabilize farm income and farm prices of agricultural commodities; to provide an adequate, balanced, & orderly flow of agricultural commodities in interstate & foreign commerce; & for other purposes; to the Committee on Agriculture & Forestry.

S-2074 (By Mr. Butler) - A bill to provide for the deduction from gross income for income tax purposes of expenses incurred by farmers in erecting facilities for the storage of crops; to the Committee on Finance.

S-2011 (By Mr. Thomas of Oklahoma) - A bill providing for the support of prices of wheat produced in 1949; to the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry.

HR-2859 - A bill to authrize the sale of public lands in Alaska; with an amendment (Rept.No.474).

S-91 - A bill to provide for the better assurance of the protection of persons within the several States from lynching, and for other purposes; with an amendment (Rept. No. 462).
