and services, using his own terminology to express the idea. Then, he added, the state has to pay salaries of police and school-teachers, hence has to tax the people to get the state's share of production. Washington Adams presented his views on "Economics" in last week's issue of our paper. He argued that workers don't really work for "money" or wages but for shares in production of goods

Adams is right in the first statement about shares of production being the aim of workers' recompense and not money, because money is merely a means of facilitating exchange. But he is wrong that the state's share of production has to be collected by taxation upon private industry.

SOME EXPLAINING NEEDED

Adams, further, proceeded to "explain" the present methods of "finance" by stating that the private system of "creating" money in the form of "bank debts" is wrong because it places public finance into private hands so the private bankers, them, may regulate the flow of money, the availability of credit, to suit their own schemes, producing artificial fluctuations of scarcity or abundance, panics and depressions, and robbing the people blind.

Adams is right, as far as he goes, in the money "creating" business, but, because, like practically all American businessmen, and like the average American public, he does not THINK from true premises and leaves out the factor of land values created by public activity, he comes to perfectly ridiculous and false conclusions which expose his deep-seated ignorance, as well as that of the American public, in line with the ignorance elsewhere prevailing among humanity. This enables the exploiters to use even Adams in the furtherance of their dirty work.

THEY WERE GOOD

It so happened that Adams became a columnist in our paper and being on the Atlantic coast we advised him to make the acquaintance of our other columnist there, Charles H. Ingersoil, who is well grounded in economics, hoping Adams would learn something. Evidently, one cannot teach old dogs new tricks, and the two got into each other's hair, instead.

Charles had visited years ago in San Diego at a Henry George convention here in the Army and Navy YMCA dining room. John Siebert, the architect, introduced me and I slipped him a few copies of THE BROOM. Charles was not impressed by my presence, one among many faces, and motored a letter from him expressing his surprise at the contents of THE BROOM and voicing his regrets at having missed making a better acquaintance. We have never met since.

EQUAL RIGHTS MAY BE ASSERTED

It is an axiom of statesmanship, which the successful founders of tyranny have understood and acted upon—that great changes can best be brought about under old forms. We, who would free men, should heed the same truth. It is the natural method. When nature would make a higher type, she takes a lower one and develops it. This, also, is the law of social growth. Let us work by it. With the current we may glide fast and far. Against it, it is hard pulling and slow progress.

I do not propose either to purchase or to confiscate private property in land. The first would be unjust; the second, needless. Let the individuals who now hold it still retain, if they want to, possession of what they are pleased to call 'their' land. Let them buy and sell, and bequeath and devise it. We may safely leave them the shell, if we take the kernel. "It is not necessary to confiscate rent."

Nor to take rent for public uses is it necessary that the state should bother with the letting of lands, and assume the chances of the favoritism, collusion, and corruption this might involve. It is not necessary that any new machinery should be created. The machinery already exists. Instead of extending it, all we have to do is to simplify and reduce it. By leaving to land owners a percentage of rent which would probably be much less than the cost and loss involved in attempting to rent lands through State agency, and by making use of this existing machinery, we may, without jar or shock, assert the common right to land by taking rent for public uses.

We already take some

We already take some rent in taxation. We have only to make some changes in our modes of taxation to take it all. What I, therefore, propose, as the simple yet sovereign remedy, which will raise wages, increase the earnings of capital, extirpate pauperism, abolish poverty, give remunerative employment to whoever wishes it, afford free scope to human powers, lessen crime, elevate morals, and taste, and intelligence, purify government and carry civilization to yet nobler heights, is—to appropriate rent by taxation.

The Editor:

The successive rounds of strikes which have already taken place are chiefly responsible for the very serious increase in the cost of living which we now have. Further strikes will certainly lead to economic disaster if they are allowed to take place. It should be understood that there is no necessary relation between the cost of living and rates of wages paid. With normal conditions and a just system of taxation the cost of living becomes less and less every year, while incomes are increased as a reward for increased fiftiency. Strikes are destructive of this natural order. They provide arbitrary advantage to a few at the expense of every consumer. Incidentally, there is no necessary relation between profits and wage scales. The same wages are paid to oil well drillers who bring in dry holes as to those who bring in gushars; also the same wages are paid to workers at non-paying mines. The important thing is what money will buy, not the amount of the paycheck. Everyone, including organized laborers, would be better off had there been no strikes during the past fifty years. There is only one right way to secure social justice and that is the Henry George plan of providing equal rights for all and special privileges to none.

Title-Holders are potentially everyone. I.E., EVERYONE does or wants to, or SHOULD want to, use land and therefore needs to OWN it. There is only DE-merit in stigmatizing them in the various ways a LAND-MONOPOLIST only is rightly subject to STIGMA.

The H.G.S.S.S. teacher who teaches that land owner or holder is as such subject to our H.G. attack and destruction, is far more blamable for this offense than L.D.B., (or you, the debater) for attack on title holding.

This is because subject to the Georgean Economist attack is just one wrong—THE MONOPOLY OF LAND. Title-Holding, Landowning, Private-ownership and other alleged social offenses are not only bad habits but they interfere with our whole effort of application of the cure of what alls society.

The difference between title-holding and monopoly is:—the former is a farmer who produces food or a householder who has built a house. A monopolist holds title to or owns land which he does not use but rents to the user at a profit above its cost to him.

A FRIEND AND ECONOMIST seems to do a little glorifying of 'authorities' as desirable adjuncts of government where my assumption is that they are desirable, as many other monopolies are, as 'better than going without,'
