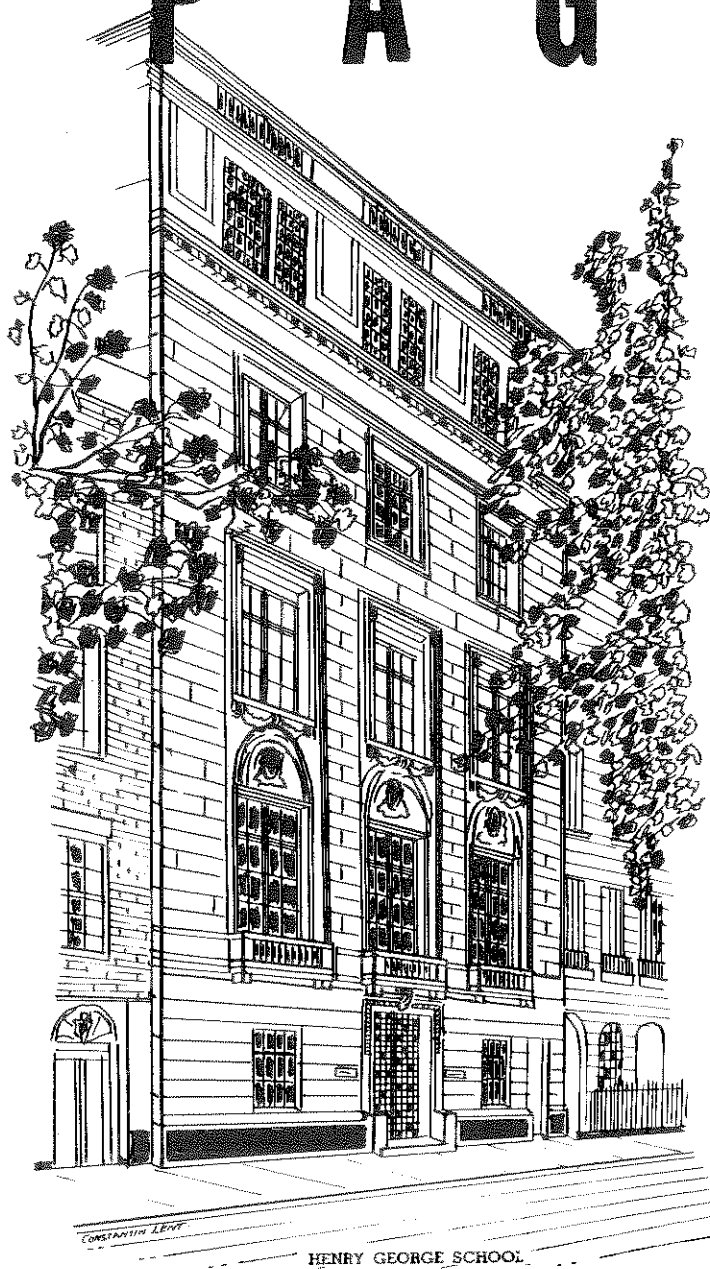

HISTORY OF THE HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL - (Chapter 4)

Under the supervision of a new Director, Norman Fowles, (now deceased) the undertaking went steadily forward. Soon the New York School was followed by branches in Chicago, Newark, St. Louis, Kansas City, San Francisco and other places. It was in 1936 that one of our ablest and most friendly counselors, John C. Lincoln of the Lincoln Electric Company, became one of our steadfast supporters and who now is, and for some time past has been President of our School's Board of Trustees. In that year also (1936) our popular Mr. Lancaster Greene represented the School at the Fifth International Conference of Georgists for Land Value Taxation and Free Trade in London, while the Sixth Conference was held in New York City in 1939. At the Seventh Convocation of this group in 1949, again held in England, we were so fortunate as to be represented by our present Director, Mr. Robert Clancy. In spite of the interruptions of two world wars among the countries sending delegates to one or more of these important gatherings, besides the United States were Canada, Britain, Denmark and Australia, with plans discussed at this most recent meeting for beginning new schools in Belgium, Germany and New Zealand. With some 200 persons present representing no less than 26 countries, this Seventh Conference held at Swanwick, Derbyshire, England, was one of the most successful ever held.

THE STRUGGLE AGAINST DESTRUCTION

In this day and age, as in the past, the individual feels impotent. The social pressures to which he is constantly being subjected buffet him about. Indeed the strain of living requires so much human energy that most men seldom have time and energy to expend for those human endeavors which are progressive in nature and make for growing maturity.

Those of us who have studied Progress and Poverty are indeed fortunate. We have been able to achieve an insight into the causative forces that are daily driving our society and all of Western Culture toward decay. We have been able to make logical sense out of social diseases which to the uninitiated must appear as a kalidascope of neuroticisms.

Through study, group discussion, and individual consultations, we have been fortunate enough to discover a social reform which can be utilized as a foundation for all other reforms.

The problem of personal living does not automatically solve itself however. Our aim should not be to propagate our philosophy in an unorganized, ineffectual manner. Our aim must be to utilize all of our resources, both human and material, to eliminate poverty in our time.

This is a problem that can only be solved through group action. But, also, it can only be solved by a group that acts adequately and is not despaired by temporary failures. Membership in S.A.G.E. is without full personal meaning if it is static and timid. Good intentions are insufficient. I cannot tell you personally what you can do because I have no personal knowledge of your abilities and limitations. But I do know that you will not be happy unless you can take personal action and thereby achieve personal satisfaction.

The first step toward positive action is positive attendance at meetings. Strange, is it not, that great actions and noble intentions can only be fulfilled through a series of prosaic acts? But there are no other alternatives. The only way to cooperate is to cooperate. But, before one can cooperate, one must attend.

From A Long Range Viewpoint

(From Book 5, Chapter 2, Page 287, Fiftieth Anniversary Edition, Progress & Poverty)

"The simple theory which I have outlined.....explains this conjunction of poverty with wealth, of low wages with high productive power, of degradation amid enlightenment, of virtual slavery in political liberty. It harmonizes, as results flowing from a general and inexorable law, facts otherwise most perplexing".

News In Our Times

Writing in a recent issue of the New York Post, there appears an article by Robert S. Allen in which he asserts that Assistant Labor Secretary, John W. Gibson, "Made no bones about the gravity of the jobless situation," and declared that "unemployment probably will soar to 5,000,000 by Spring".

George's appraisal of the News as good NOW as THEN!

"Tax manufacturers, and the effect is to check manufacturing; tax improvements, and the effect is to lessen improvements; tax commerce, and the effect is to prevent exchange; tax capital, and the effect is to drive it away. But the whole value of land may be taken in taxation, and the only effect will be to stimulate industry, to open new opportunities to capital and to increase the production of wealth". Give labor a free field and its full earnings; take for the benefit of the whole community that fund which the growth of the community creates, and want, and the fear of want would be gone. The springs of production would be set free, and the normous increase of wealth would give the poorest ample comfort. Men would no more worry about unemployment than they would worry about finding air to breathe; they need have no more care about physical necessities than do the lillies of the field. The progress of science, the march of invention, the diffusion of knowledge, would bring their benefits to all".
(P. & P. Book 8, Chapter 3, Page 414 and Book 9, Chapter 4, Page 461).

CONSTITUTION CHANGE

Because Article IV of our Constitution limits membership in SAGE only to persons having studied the fundamental course in an accredited Henry George School, shutting the door, as it were, to those Georgists who were believers in the Philosophy before the establishment of the School, Article IV will be amended as follows, so as to broaden membership requirements:

AMENDMENT: - "Any person who has proven his or her acceptability by having performed any notable service to aid in advancing the Henry George Philosophy, prior to or after the establishment of the Henry George School of Social Science, shall be eligible for membership in this organization".

This publication of the proposed amendment is the notice requisite to all members as per Article VIII, covering Amendments. Ballot action on the Amendment will be taken at the next regular meeting, Sunday, May 7th, 1950.

SENATOR LEHMAN AND THE WELFARE STATE

The New York Times of Sunday, April 16th, reports that Senator Lehman spoke at the 45th Anniversary Luncheon of the League for Industrial Democracy at the Hotel Commodore and received the League's citation for Public Service.

During the course of his speech he said, "Men of little vision have lost sight of the important truth of our times - that a Government which has secured the greatest degree of welfare for its people is the Government which stands most firmly against totalitarianism.

The critics of the welfare state do not understand this simple fact. They spend their time looking for Communists in and out of Government and at the same time attack those measures which would deprive the Communists and would-be Communists of their ammunition and of their audience".

"To my mind the welfare state is simply a state in which people are free to develop their individual capacities, to receive just rewards for their talents and to engage in the pursuit of happiness, unburdened by the fear of actual hunger, actual homelessness or by oppression by reason of race, creed or color".

If the welfare state is what the Senator seems to think it is, what human being on the face of this earth could be opposed to it? To the Senator, the welfare state means happiness, human dignity, and freedom for all men; therefore it is worthwhile and should be desired by all men.

This however, is not all he has to say on the subject. Earlier in his speech we find the following remark: "The extension of special privilege is an essential and basic program of the welfare state".

Now the subject matter is seen in a clearer perspective, and this pertinent question has to be asked: Can society remain healthy, through the extension of special privileges for certain groups within that society? Or to ask the question in an inverted form: Does the welfare state defeat its purpose through the use of unjust methods?

Obviously it does. No man actually believes that just ends can be obtained through the exercise of unjust means. It seems obvious that the extension of privilege will not make for justice among men for the very simple reason that there are never enough privileges to go around. Also it must be kept in mind that every privilege must be secured and maintained through the use of force and fraud. Why then do men of reasoning power and integrity subscribe to the philosophy of the welfare state? This is a very easy question to answer. The philosophy of the welfare state is one that no man can, in his heart, be opposed to. Actually it is not the philosophy of the welfare state that men are opposed to, it is the economics of the welfare state; the economics of indirect taxation, Government pump-priming, and deficit spending.

Let us rephrase the question. What men or groups of men, subscribe to the economics of the welfare state, and why do they do so?

Most men do so out of disgust for and mistrust of the economics of the so-called free enterprise Republican party. The average man in the street believes that it is better to submit himself to the Government pension and subsidy system than it is to submit himself to the vagaries of a free market system that has never been completely free and has never satisfied his most elemental needs and desires. Other men subscribe to welfare state economics out of intellectual need to find answers to the ever pressing problem of poverty. These men were probably the first to embrace the welfare state, and unless they have some special interest in its continuation, they will be the first to see its shortcomings and disavow it.

The third great group supporting this economic system is the large merchandising capitalists class; the wealthy men that are called liberal. They find it good business to do so for as long as the Government pays pensions and subsidies, and primes the pump, men will have money to spend in the retail marketplace.

In the light of these facts it becomes evident, in my mind at least, that the welfare state will never be defeated with platitudes about statism and socialism. The welfare state, like slums, unemployment, and depressions, is simply another symptom of a sick society. It is only another manifestation of poverty in a perverted form. Can any man honestly say that the welfare state would be an issue in a society that did not have poverty? Of course not. It therefore becomes obvious that the welfare state is a false issue. The only issue of our time, or any other time in human history, is the elimination of poverty. The only real issue is the private ownership and collection of economic rent. Today as in the past, our enemy is land value speculation.

Can any man prove otherwise? If so, let him try ...

FROM THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Following are three bills taken from the Congressional Record, together with suggested forms of letters to be written:

Bill S.3287: - A bill to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to dispose of the remaining lots in the town site of St.Marks, Fla.; to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

Suggested Letter: To Comm.on Int. & Insular Affairs; also Finance Comm.of House of Representatives Chairman:

"Honorable Sir: In reference to Bill S.3287 for disposal of the lands in the town site of St.Marks, Florida, it is my opinion that the lots could not be disposed of unless they were desirable.....Their desirability accrues to the lands value. This value is created by the people and belongs to the people.

The land's value (not including improvements) is the natural revenue of Government and should be collected by the leasing of these lands by the Government, not the disposal of them as intended by this bill. As the value of the land increases---the amount at which it is leased should increase. Respectfully ..."

Bill S.3334: - By Mr.Thomas of Oklahoma - A bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code by increasing the excise tax on imported crude petroleum and crude petroleum derivatives; to the Committee on Finance.

Suggested Letter: To Mr. Thomas, Senator from Oklahoma, the Senate, Washington, D.C. and the Comm.on Finance, House of Representatives, Chairman:

"Honorable Sir: In reference to Bill S.3334 to amend the Internal Revenue Code by increasing the excise tax on imported crude petroleum and their derivatives. I believe taxes on products are not the natural form of revenue and the burden of these taxes fall on those who use and produce the product - LABOR and CAPITAL.

Place the increased tax on the oil lands value, not on improvements on the land. This tax cannot be passed on to the consumer because land is a fixed quantity - and those who use that land should pay for the privilege of the use of it over the citizens who do not have the privilege of using it. Respectfully"

Bill S.3333 - By Mr. Chavez for Mr. Downey: - A bill to authorize a survey to determine the feasibility and advisability of constructing a multi-purpose tunnel through the Laguna Mountains in San Diego County, Calif. To the Committee on Public Works.

Suggested Letter: - To Comm. on Public Works - Mr. Chavez - Comm. on Finance:

"Honorable Sir: In reference to Bill S.3333 referred to the Committee on Public Works ... If this bill is passed land values in that area will increase, this increased value belongs to all the people and should be collected by the Government for the people.

Place a tax on the land in the surrounding area (not on any improvements) and collect this land value. If you fail to do so, this value will go into the hands of private individuals who did nothing to deserve it. Respectfully ..."

Its Officers Are

Members of the organization nominated and elected by the membership for a period of one year. They are guided by a Constitution: and all activities are conducted in a democratic, parliamentary procedure.
