MAYOR MCNAIR RESIGNS

Pittsburgh, Pa., October 6th, (HCNS) -- Mayor William N. WcNair submitted his resignation today to the city clerk to be effective immediately. Cornelius D. Scully, president of the City Council and member of the Board of Directors of the Henry George Foundation of America, was named successor for the year and three month's of the unexpired term.

Mayor McNair's administration had in it many followers of Henry George who neglected no opportunity to advance the movement.

The crisis in the affairs of the city government was precipitated by the failure of the mayor and the city council to agree on the appointment of the city treasurer and Mayor McNair resigned in order to permit the city to function. As he walked out of the city hall he returned to the little law office from which he emerged three years ago to become the city's chief executive.

Translations of the classroom material will be made to conform to the Danish edition of Progress and Poverty (Fremskridt og Fattigdom). "It is our intention to adhere strictly to the method and manual of the School", said Nr. Bjorner.

We who have the knowledge of these principles, must do everything possible to popularize them widely," is the keynote of the message that is going to the officers of the chapters of the Henry George Fellowship and other alumni groups throughout the United States.

WILL CONTINUE FIGHT FOR THE RALSTON AMUNDMENT.

San Francisco, Calif., October 6th (HCMS) -- Hundreds of thousands of people have gained new i eas upon the subject of taxation that they will not forget, as a result of the campaign of the Sales Tax Repeal Association for the Ralston amendment, says a bulletin of the Association just released. The Amendment was to have been voted upon on November 2 and was removed from the ballot on by a technicality by a decision of the State Supreme Court, Justice

It claims for the amendment the solid support of the Labor Press and the unanimous vote of every labor organization before which it was brought. Because of its firm conviction that the public must be thoroughly instructed in what it stands for, the Association proposes to maintain permanent offices in Los Angeles and San Francisco and the work will be continuous.

"We are out to win a war, not a battle," declares the report, over the signature of former Judge Jackson R. Ralston, General Chairman and N.D. Alper, Executive Secretary of the Northern Section.
