

#### CITIES IN OREGON ADDED TO SCHOOL MAP

PORTLAND, ORE. (HGNS) - The first extension classes in Portland will be opened on Friday, May 7, reports Arthur W. Falvey, field organizer of the Henry George School of Social Science, 211 West 79th Street, New York. Mrs. Anne B. Lorenz will serve as instructor of the afternoon class as well as extension secretary. Arthur B. Brock will teach the evening class. Many of the students enrolled as a result of a campaign in which 3000 triple postcard announcements were sent out.

At Coquille, Ore. an extension class started in April under Dr. Joseph Richmond, who has for many years carried on a campaign of education in the principles of Henry George.

Textbooks have already been ordered to start in Eugene this fall, according to an announcement of Mrs. Jean K. Sutherland, enthusiastic Georgist and daughter of Alexander Hamilton, a sponsor of the Victoria, B.C. Extension.

#### ZETA PSI TO HOUSE EXTENSION CLASS

NEW YORK (HGNS) - Lancaster H. Greene, one of the faculty of the Henry George School of Social Science and a member of its Board of Trustees, has just announced that he has gained the consent of the Zeta Psi Fraternity to conduct an extension class of the Henry George School in its clubrooms, 31 East 39th Street. This is the first of the quota of at least fifty such classes which the School hopes to open in New York City by September.

Extension classes have been springing up in all parts of the city and its environs since the first class outside of the School headquarters in New York held its opening session on January 13 at the home of Mac V. Edds, instructor, in Montclair, N.J. Today there are twenty extension classes scattered throughout the metropolitan area.

#### SCHOOL TO FORM SECOND CLASS FOR YOUNG MEN'S BOARD OF TRADE

NEW YORK CITY (HGNS) - Members of the Young Men's Board of Trade, a division of the New York Board of Trade, have again been invited to take the course in fundamental economics given by the Henry George School of Social Science, 211 West 79th Street, in a letter sent out over the signatures of Sidney Tobias, its treasurer, newly elected president of the New York Chapter of the Henry George Fellowship; Lancaster H. Greene, a trustee and member of the faculty of the Henry George School, L.E. Peterson, Eli Garrison, William Quasha and Stanford Bissel.

The School formed a special class for members of this organization last January as a result of a mass response to a similar letter.

#### SCHOOL AN EXAMPLE TO EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM

NEW YORK (HGNS) - On Monday, April 12, Charles H. Ingersoll, editor of "Democracy" and president of the Lanhattan Single Tax Club founded by Henry George, was a guest at the Henry George School of Social Science, 211 West 79th Street and for two hours sat in on a class in political economy and watched the students "lapping up this 'dismal science.'"

"Every university, college and high school in the country teaches something or other called economics, but none of them the science called economics," said Mr. Ingersoll. "If this example does not wake up our whole educational system, they are even sounder asleep than I thought," he declared.

## CANADIAN ASSOCIATION SENDS OUT 175,000 BROADSIDES

TORONTO (HGIS) - A broadside containing a half page paper entitled "Business Recovery by Commonsense Taxation" in the name of the Single Tax Association of Canada has just been sent to 175,000 homes in Toronto and another 5,000 to nearby communities.

It is pointed out in this paper that while taxation on human endeavor has a tendency to restrict that endeavor, a tax on land values has the opposite effect and brings land into use. The Association has already received a number of inquiries as a result of this broadside.

Ingersoll, president of the Manhattan Single Tax Club, 1165 Broadway, an organization founded by Henry George. ## DR. JACKLIN URGES CIRCULATING OF CHINESE TRANSLATIONS OF GEORGE'S WORKS

NEW YORK (HGIS) - Dr. W.E. Jacklin, who translated Progress and Poverty and Protection of Free Trade into Chinese in collaboration with Li Yu Shu and Tao Lung Chwang, Chinese scholars, recently wrote to Anna George de Mille, President of the Board of Trustees of the Henry George School of Social Science, urging that the consul in every city where there is a Chinese Consulate should be approached with copies of Progress and Poverty and Protection of Free Trade for the officers of the consulate who read English and in Chinese for those who do not. The letter was written on a typewriter presented to Dr. Jacklin many years ago by Joseph Pels, who contributed generously to keep alive the name and the philosophy of Henry George until his death in 1914.

Mrs. de Mille has already arranged to have a copy of these translations placed in the Chatham Square Public Library in the Chinese section of Lower New York and in the Central Collection at Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street.

A copy of Dr. Jacklin's Chinese translation of Progress and Poverty and Protection of Free Trade were presented to the East Oriental Library at Princeton, New Jersey.

"Jacklin of Hanking," by Edith Eberle, tells the story of the life of this Ontario born missionary who spent forty years in China as a physician and teacher of the philosophy of Henry George. (Bethany Press, St. Louis, Mo.)

Through Noah D. Alper, Secretary of the San Francisco Extension of the Henry George School, she hopes to have them widely distributed both in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The Henry George School has about 200 copies of Progress and Poverty and Protection of Free Trade in Chinese, the gift of Benjamin B. Burger, indefatigable Georgist and collector of Henry George memorabilia.

## MORE CLASSES STARTING IN NEW SOUTH WALES

SYDNEY, N.S.W. (HGIS) - The Standard of Sydney, organ of the Henry George League of New South Wales reported in its March issue that a new class in the Senior School of the Sydney Extension of the Henry George School of Science was expected to take up the study of Progress and Poverty on March 3 under Dr. Miller. The juniors were just about half way through The Condition of Labor.

In Lakemba a new economics science class commenced on February 15 with a largely increased enrollment. This class has two sections -- one of beginners, the other advanced students. W. A. Dove and Mr. Davies presided on the opening night and the students appeared impressed by the introductory lectures.
