Dear Otto:

Our friendly conversation of last evening has since brought to my mind the good old days.

I wonder if you have ever realized how much I regret having to cease teaching at the School. Even though I am dog-tired, what with my business of law and LAND AND FREEDOM, nothing would give me more pleasure than taking a class. But here's the rub. Assuming that I again offered my services, what would be my position in the event that the Director should again find provocation for excluding LAND AND FREEDOM? Do you not agree that I would be compelled again to resign from the School? As a matter of fact, when LAND AND FREEDOM was first desecrated in 1940, I was right in the middle of the ten sessions of "Progress and Poverty," and it required almost superhuman effort on my part to remain until the end under the strain of humiliation. I should never, of course, permit myself to be placed in that position again.

All of the foregoing assumes that I might be of some value as a teacher. On the other hand, I am aware of my shortcomings in the pedagogical field, and I can understand that one such as myself is not sorely missed, if at all. However, I just pass on these thoughts in a friendly manner to indicate that my heart is still in the School But under the present sircumstances, LAND AND FREEDOM of necessity my first consideration.
