DEAR FRIEND:

Enclosed we present to you a facsimile reprint of the Provisional Charter, suitable for framing, granted to the Henry George School of Social Science by the Board of Regents for and on behalf of the State Education Department of the State of New York.

In the language of this Charter, "This Provisional Charter will be replaced by an Absolute Charter if within five years the corporation shall acquire resources and equipment available for its use and support and sufficient and suitable for its chartered purposes in the judgment of the Regents of the University, and be maintaining an institution of educational usefulness and character satisfactory to them."

We also enclose a short prospectus of the School's work and a copy of the address of Mr. Oscar H. Geiger, the Director of the School, read by Mr. Joseph Dana Miller, Editor of "Land and Freedom" at the Seventh Henry George Congress, held at Memphis, Tenn., October 10, 11 and 12, 1932.

The School already reaches over one hundred University, College and Senior High School students every week in its Classes and Forums at its three meeting places in New York, and this without a permanent Class and Forum Headquarters and without a Library and Reading-room.

With a permanent headquarters of its own, always open, where classes may be held during the day or evenings at the convenience of students; where a suitable Library may be always at the disposal of those interested in the philosophy of Henry George or those seeking to learn; where a constant point of immediate contact with students and the public may be always maintained, there is hardly any limit that the School may not reach.

A minimum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) a year is needed to do the work outlined. The School depends entirely on the voluntary contributions of its well-wishers and followers of Henry George. All Classes, Forums, Individual Instruction and Correspondence Courses are free.

If the School is to accomplish the task it has set for itself; if it is to meet the requirements of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York—the Education Department of the State of New York, in order to have its provisional charter replaced by a Permanent charter; if it is to become the Educational Center of the Henry George movement, as it is now well on the way of becoming, it must be supported financially. IT NEEDS YOUR HELP; IT NEEDS IT NOW.
