THE TAX MESSAGE

Simply stated, it revolves around our entire system of taxation, but it is but one part of the story. Rather than tax the products of labor, via an income tax or sales tax, or the rewards of capital through various business taxes, only one factor of production should be taxed—the value of land. By freeing the productive process of these onerous taxes.

production would increase. That's what supply side economics is all about, but its attempts are futile and minimal. By taxing land values, a passive element in the productive process, we can reverse the process by encouraging production, rather than by inhibiting its growth. In 1879, Henry George wrote the all-time bestseller in economics, Progress and Poverty. Strangely enough, although it has received endorsements from many notables, it is still not as well known as other economic works. Why have economists such as Karl Marx, who has been disproven in many respects, received wide coverage in many economic textbooks, and yet scant mention is made of Henry George? High school and college students are innundated with Marxist philosophy and socialist thinking, while one of America's truly great thinkers is ignored. DEFICIT SPENDING

Before it was fashionable to speak out against deficit spending, well over one hundred years ago Henry George wrote about the dangers of government spending more than it receives. Borrowing, as opposed to taxation, as a means of paying for the cost of government, has been a technique used extensively for the past fifty years.

As to its relation to inflation and the interest accrued on principal, it is certainly a factor connected with debts. However, there is also an ethical and moral question rarely mentioned in the public debate. Both the economic and moral issues ought to be considered together:

 Spending
