

Mexican Venture Continued Our place is located in the wide open spaces, with mountains in the distance on all sides. As we are

close to the margin here, I get a first hand view of what determines wages. Although all the land is owned, it is pretty much common domain. Small boys tend flocks of goats on it, and you can see oxcarts and burros coming back in the evening laden with firewood. Obviously these people wouldn't work for others for less than they can make on their own. Once a year people come to gather the fruit of the pirckly pear cactus, which they sell on the street corners in town. Here, in these modern times, is an example of wealth produced without the aid of capital, clearly showing that land and labor are the fundamental factors in production.

These are some of the things we see from the terrace in front of our place, which is now completed, and includes a swimming pool and miniature golf course. Flowers, trees, and grass now grow where once there was only cactus. The mile high altitude here makes for an ideal year 'round climate, particularly popular in the summer. Our rates are very reasonable, and include home-cooked meals. Naturally Georgists are extra welcome, and if enough are interested, it may be possible to conduct a special advanced course here this summer. For further information, contact your L.A.
