# 41 Class Representatives Counsel on School Plans

Representatives of thirty-four beginning and seven advanced classes met at headquarters of the School on Saturday afternoon, November 28 to counsel on plans for the coming commencement and on ways and means for advancing the class work in the next term.

Henry L. T. Tideman, director, recounted the growth of the School since it was chartered in 1932 by the University of the State of New York, the number of graduates having mounted from 84 the first year to a total throughout the country of over 30,000 today. How the School is carried on by graduates who give of their time as teachers and secretaries, and of their funds as sponsors, was described by Hon. Max M. Korshak, treasurer of the board of trustees. The average printing and postage expense for getting one student enrolled and through the course, he pointed out, is approximately five dollars. Contributions, whatever the amounts, he made clear, are not for past expenses of the School, but for securing new students.

Discussion was led by John Lawrence Monroe, associate director. Representatives reported back to their respective classes the following week. Contributions received by the representatives from fellow graduates will be turned in to the treasurer at commencement on December 11 where the total received will be announced.

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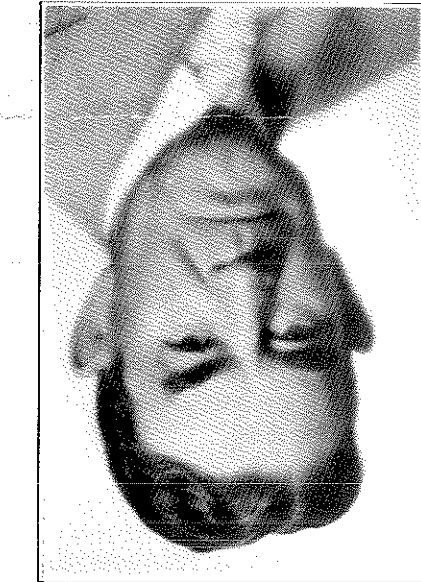
## Thought of the Month
