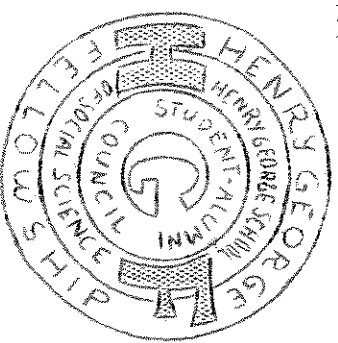


THE HENRY GEORGE FELLOWSHIP

Henry George tells us that a free society is the most effective one.

Let the Henry George Fellowship then be a free society, freely entered into for the advancement of a common ideal.

In its inception its purpose was, and is, "To draw into closer bonds of Unity and Effort the followers of Henry George, to the end that others may be enabled to see the star they see - that star that foretells the Dawn of the Day when their cause for the ultimate freedom of man shall triumph."

The Henry George Fellowship, launched in April, 1934, has already over 500 members. Its membership consists of all the alumni of all the classes of the HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE wherever formed, unless the individual graduate signifies, when the idea is presented, that he does not desire to belong.

Actual signing up in the Fellowship need not occur, but the names of all members shall go to the National Headquarters of the HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE. It is proposed that we proceed along these lines until the roster of names in the Fellowship throughout the nation is one hundred thousand strong!

The Henry George Fellowship, then, is not an organized body; it is the growing body of alumni of the Henry George School of Social Science who already are being drawn "into closer bonds of Unity and Effort to the end that others may be enabled to see the star they see."

The watch-word of the Fellowship is - "Let Us Move Forward Together!"

STUDENT ALUMNI COUNCIL

Some such group as the Student-Alumni Council in the main School, (and in Pittsburgh) will almost inevitably organize itself early amongst the students and alumni in classes, or groups of classes, where the burden of the work grows heavy upon the teacher or teachers. This group will seek to lighten such burden by sharing it, thus providing a vigorous supporting body, ready "to do any and all things conducive to the best interests of the HENRY GEORGE SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE" - to quote from the By-Laws of the Student-Alumni Council in the main School.

We may well believe that this will occur because of the feeling of Fellowship with one another that will have resulted from association during the study of "Progress and Poverty" with group discussion.

All alumni will have had one great teacher, Henry George, whose voice has been heard through their own particular teacher. They will naturally desire to aid this teacher in the work of enlightening others, thus increasing the ever growing ranks of the Henry George Fellowship.

The S.A.C is to be concerned solely with the educational program of the Henry George School of Social Science, trusting in these words of Henry George, "Until there be correct thought, there cannot be right action; and when there is correct thought, right action; and when there is correct thought, right action will follow."

OTHER GROUPS

Groups, not purely educational in nature, will undoubtedly arise amongst the Alumni of the School and its Extension Classes, for the gifts and abilities of the great and growing body will be many and varied.

These groups will probably select their own members and work along lines that especially appeal to them, under their own group names.

SUMMARY

All alumni of all the classes wherever formed become members of the Henry George Fellowship unless they prefer not to belong.

Alumni and students will probably form organizations, with aims and names as they prefer - but one such organization should be a Student-Alumni Council, to aid in the local work, and to keep its graduate body, the Henry George Fellowship, in touch with the School's activities and needs, thus providing means for the continuing and growing co-operation of all alumni in the work of The Henry George School of Social Science.
