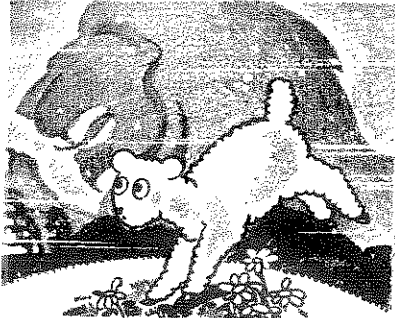

For Fri., Apr. 1 - JACK ADDINGTON, Minister of the Church of Religious Science, San Diego. Subject: land, trade, and human relations.

For Fri., Apr. 8 - DON BELDING, nationally known business and civic leader, Chairman of the Executive Committee, Foote, Cone, and Belding (Advertising). Subject: freedom and economic education. "We are met on Form 1040. We have come to dedicate a large portion of our income to a final resting place with those men who have spent their lives that they may spend our money. It is altogether anguish and torture that we do this. But in a larger sense, we cannot evade, we cannot cheat, we cannot underestimate this tax. The collectors, clever and sly, who computed here, have gone far beyond our poor power to add and subtract."

"Our creditors will little note nor long remember what we pay here, but the Bureau of Internal Revenue can never forget what we report here."

"It is not for us, the taxpayers, to question the tax which the government has thus far so nobly spent. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us - that from these vanishing dollars we take increased devotion to the few remaining; that we here highly resolve that next year will find us in a higher income bracket; that this taxpayer, underpaid, shall figure out more deductions; and that this tax of the people, by the Congress, for the government, shall not cause solvency to perish."

Danish Parliamentary
Commission Recommends
Full Land Value Tax

The commission appointed 6 1/2 years ago in Denmark to look into the problems and possibilities of collecting the full ground rent recently completed its study and made its report - a 333 page document. It proposes collection by the government of an additional land value tax (over and above any present ones), based on 4% of the selling price, but only after certain compensation to the landowners by the government. To our knowledge, it says nothing about reducing or repealing taxes on products of labor.

LAND AND LIBERTY criticizes the compensation feature, although Dr. Vilgo Starcke defends it in a recent letter to us.

Soaring

The Mar. 10 WALL ST. JOURNAL states: "Outside Los Angeles, some suburban tracts cost twice as much as two years ago. Samples: an acre has gone up from \$3,000 to \$6,000 in one of the ... mushrooming neighborhoods. It was once a joke, but L.A. builders now say seriously that they may be forced out to the nearby sprawling Mojave desert for home sites."

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
