Are we like the chap who was asked to empty a bath tub nearly full of water the plug in place and spigots running with a tin cup? Will he start bailing? Or will he stop the spigots and pull the

Our country is like the bathtub, full of corruption, not of water. Are Shurch and School like the tin cup in the face of unstopped forces which breed corruption and moral decay? Is an act corrupt only if it violates man-made law? Or is it possible that the law is corrupt? Are good people, innocently or knowingly corrupters by condoning bad laws?

If theatres, railroads, newspapers—(whose compositors must set type anyway even if suitable mats are provided), are forced to employ unneeded men, is this corruption?

Suppose I owned an acre of land at #1 Wall Street, NYC. Suppose I could lease it for \$1-million a year, with rent increases with inflation, all taxes paid by lease, and improvements to my heirs at the end of a 999 year lease? I and my descendents will be able to take food, clothing, shelter, luxuries and cultural values out of the system with no need to produce anything at all. Is this corruption? Is this "featherbedding"? Is this son are not all other forms very mild increase?

And, because RENT-of-land is lost to those who create it, endless taxes, multiplying and compounding, are imposed at all levels of government, in all states; a vast domineering source of temptation to lie and cheat - a cesspool of corruption. If morals fracture here, what may they be like at other points? And the answer at this point so direct, so very effective and moral - collect the publicly created RENT-of-land, abolish taxes as quickly and completely as possible. 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Wages? As By gradually transferring to wages that portion of the current wealth that now flows to privilege. In other words, it would widen the channel of wages by emlarging opportunities for labor, and by intreasing the purchasing power of nominal wages through reduction of prices. On the other hand, it would marrow the channel of privilege by making the man who has a privilege pay for it what it is worth

Wages? A. Prices unenhanced by privi-lege, and wages undiminished by taxation. worth.

the bulk of the burden of taxation?

A. Because in the private appropriation of the annual site value of land is found the bulk of privilege.

Q. In what other respects is land a better subject for taxation than anything else? A. Land has three generic pecularities by which it differs radically from everything else; l.It is that the site value of land is a creation of the community—a public or social value.

2. It is that no tax, new or old, on the site value of land can be recovered from the tenant or user by raising his rent.

3. It is that the selling value of land reduced as it is by the capitalized tax that is imposed upon it, is an untaxed value. Whatever lowers the income from land lowers proportionally its selling price, so that whether the established tax upon it has been light or heavy, it is no burden upon the new purchaser, who buys it at its net value and thus escapes all part in the tax burden which he should in justice share with those who now bear it all.

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
