WORLD WAR III

"We saw Christianity and Civilization march hand in hand through the ages-leaving death and desolation in their wake... and always we had wars, and more wars, and still other wars-all over the world. Sometimes in the private interest of royal families, sometimes to crush a weak nation, but never a war started by the aggressor for any clean purpose—there is no such war in the history of the race. This progress down to the present - the future - slaughters more terrible in their destruction of life, more devastating in their engines of war, than any we have seen. Cain did his murder with a club; the Hebrews did their murders with javelins and swords; the Greeks and Romans added protective armor and the fine arts of military organization and generalship; the Ohristian has added guns and gunpowder; a few centuries from now he will have so greatly improved the deadly effectiveness of his weapons of slaughter that all men will confess that without Christian civilization war must have remained a poor and triffing thing to the end of time.

It is a remarkable progress. In five or six thousand years five or six high civilizations have risen, flourished, commanded the wonder of the world, then faded out and disappeared; and not one of them, except the latest ever invented any sweeping and adequate way to kill people. They all did their best to kill being the chiefest ambition of the human race and the earliest incident in its history—but only the Christian civilization has scored a triumph to be proud of. Two or three centuries from now it will be recognized that all the competent killers are Christians; then the pagan world will go to school to the Christian—not to acquire his religion, but his gams. The Turk and

the Chinaman will buy those to kill m³
 sionaries and converts with.

And what does it amount to? Nothing at all. You gain nothing; you always come out where you went in. For a million years the race has gone on monotonously propagating itself and monotonously repreforming this dull nonsense—to what end? No wisdom can guess; Who gets a profit out of it? Nobody but a parcel of usurping little monarchs and nobilities who despise you; whom you slave for, fight for, die for, and are not ashamed of it, but proud; whose existence is a perpetual insult to you and you are afraid to resent it; who are mendicants supported by your alms, yet assume toward you the airs of benefactor toward beggar; who address you in the language of master to slave, and are answered in the language of slave to master; who are worshiped by you with your mouth, while in your heart—if you have one—you despise yourselves for it. The first man was a hypocrite and a comard, qualities which have not yet failed in his line; it is the foundation upon which all civilizations have been built.

There has never been a just one, never an honorable one, on the part of the instigator of the war. I can see a million years ahead, and this rule will never change in so many as half a dozen instances. The loud little handful—as usual—will shout for the war. The pulpit will, and cautiously, object—at first; the great, big, dull bulk of the nation will rub its sleepy eyes and try to make out why there should be a war, and will.say, earnestly and indigantly, "It is unjust and dishonorable, and there is no necessity for it." Then the handful will shout louder. A few fair men on the other side will argue and reason against the war wit speech and pen, and at first will have a hearing and be applauded; but it will not last long; those others will outshout them and presently the anti-war audiences will think out and loose popularity. Before long you will see this curious thing; the speakers—stoned from the platform, and free speach strangled by hordes of furiou men who in their secret hearts are still at one with those stoned speakers—as earlier—but do not dare to say so. And now the wnole nation—pulpit and all—will take up the war—cry, and shout theelf hoarse, and mob any honest man who ven—bures to open his mouth; and presently such mouths will anyent cheap lies, putting the blame upon the nation that is attacke and every man will be glad of those conscience—soothing falsities, and will dillegently such mouths of them; and will dillegently such should them, and refuse to examine any refutations of them; and thus he will by and by convinence himself that the war is just, and will thank God for the better sleep he enjoys after this process of
