High Land Costs Reason for In-Cressed Prices of Homes

An article in the <u>Wall Street</u>
<u>Journal</u> of Sept. 17, 1957,
said: "Rising land costs
are responsible for much
of the increase in the
price of new homes since

World War II, Roy M. Marr, President of the U.S. Savings & Loan League, asserted.

"The fact that the cost of improved lots has doubled or trebled or even quadrupled adds to the overall problem of higher costs for new homes and increases the need for a frontal attack on the cost question."

"He said undeveloped land in his home city of Memphis, Tenn., has risen from \$1,000 to \$4,000 an acre during the last five years and in some cases it is higher. Adding to the problem is the increased cost of longer length utilities and sanitary facilities needed to reach out further from the heart of cities to former rural areas. Land Cost Cont'd. "High land costs work against th builder, the home buyer and the community as well, said Mr. Marr in urging studies of the situa-

tion. 'High land costs can slow down or stop the building of homes or increase the dangers of inadequately-built homes,' he warned.

"'We used to have a rule that the cost of a lot should be 10% of the total cost of the house,' said Mr. Marr. 'While few statistics are available to clearly define the increase in land or improved lot costs, all of us know that there have been enormous increases in the cost of improved lots over the past few years
