The officers elected are Charles O'Connor Hennessy of New York, President; John Paul and A. W. Madsen of Great Britain and F. Folke and Abel Brink of Denmark, Secretaries; and Ashley Mitchell of Great Britain, Treasurer. The headquarters of the new organization are at 11, Tothill Street, London, S. W. 1. England.

# DEFEAT THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Illinois, which will be submitted in the November election, authorizes the legislature to levy taxes upon persons, property and income. It provides that "taxes levied under the authority of this section shall be uniform upon persons, property and income of the same class. All real estate shall be in one class, except that mineral land and land devoted to reforestation may be in different classes. Exemptions may be established only by general law."

If this amendment is adopted it is possible that we may have a taxation system and classification of property for taxes like this:

A. Taxes on persons—a revival of poll taxes.

Your letter of September 28th declining to appoint a committee to investigate Prof. Richard T. Ely's 'Institute for Research in Land Economics and Public Utilities' in Northwestern University, as requested in our letter to Chairman Gildersleeve of July 31st, has just been received.

With all due respect to you, Doctor, and the great Council you represent, we must ask for a reconsideration of this decision.

In the first place your Executive Committee has plainly acted in the matter before it was in possession of all the facts. During the past two years we have published in books and pamphlets a great deal of evidence against Prof. Ely and his spurious Institute in Northwestern University—evidence which we are not merely glad but anxious to submit, yet up to the present time no request has come in either from you or from any member of your Committee for this evidence. In the twery nature of things, therefore, your Committee could not have acted as intelligently in the matter as it should.

In the second place we are not persuaded that the investigation we ask is outside of the province of your Council; on the contrary, we believe it is very definitely within this province.

In the third place you state that the Trustees of Northwestern University are quite as competent as is any outside agency to 'typeserve the integrity of research' and to protect it from 'intimidation by propagandists of special creeds,' and that it is their duty to do so.

We agree with you, Doctor, that the Trustees of Northwestern are fully competent to do this, but our experience during the past year and a half has very clearly demonstrated that they are unwilling to perform their duty. We have published in the last sixteen months many articles showing the fraudulence of Prof. Elly's 'research' Institute, to which the attention of the Trustees has been called, yet up to the present time they have shown no disposition whatever to put their house in order.

Nor is this strange. The reason that the Trustees have not acted in the matter is simply because the propaganda sent out from the University under the mask of 'research' is designed to promote the very interests of the leading Trustees 's who sit upon the Eoard.

Mr. Nathan W. MacChesney, for instance, is one of the most prominent Trustees of the Northwestern University Educational Foundation directed by a board of thirty-four governors selected from the alumni, and the main purpose of which is to therefore, indisputably the most powerful voice in Northwestern University.

But Mr. MacChesney is also the General Counsel for the National Association of Real Estate Boards, an association consisting of some 27,000 active members representing over 650 state and local real estate boards, and in whose interest chiefly the propaganda manufactured by Prof. Ely's privately-financed 'research' institute in Northwestern is sent out.

You can readily see from this the futility of expecting the directors of Northwestern University to perform their duty in 'preserving the integrity of research' and in 'protecting research from intimidation by propagandists of special creeds.''
