Dear Mir:

Mrs. Fels has handed me your letter of April 17. Six hundred copies of a memorandum sent to Congressmen have been issued from this office, and the supply of copies is exhausted. However, I am enclosing copy of an article containing extracts from resolutions adopted by the United Mine Workers here and modeled along the lines of the memorandum to Congress, and am placing you on the mailing list for additional bulletins that will be issued shortly.

We are cooperating with a strong group in Washington who are actively at work for a federal amendment and action by states in the meantime. Mr. Post presided at a meeting Tuesday night attended by Messrs. Herbert Quick, Golver of the Trade Commission, Ralston, Brownlow, Newman, Siddons, Chas. Ed. Russell, Basil M. Manly, Sid Evans, and others, and another meeting will be held shortly. Thus far there has been no public notice of this Washington activity. Mrs. Fels is going to Washington Sunday to see Mr. Post on this matter. I am going down Sunday night, and after

learning more about the situation there I will write you more fully in the hope of establishing full cooperation. All are enthusiastic over the opportunity to make the land question a live issue at this time.
