THE NEW ZEALAND LEAGUE FOR THE

Annual Report of the League for the year ending 31st December 1956.

Regular monthly meetings were not held during the year. There were two general meetings of the League and the Executive met on five occasions.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT Accompanying this report is the financial statement for the year ended 31st December 1956. It is no exaggeration to say that the financial situation of the League is a cause of great anxiety. Nearly all the resources of the society have been put into the rooms in the Empire Hotel Building. The income is confined to subscriptions and donations by members and sympathisers. There is some prospect of revenue from renting the Indeed this has become a reality but not during the League rooms. period covered by this report. These are a small and insecure source from which to meet regular payments of interest and principal and leave practically nothing for advancing the proper work of the League. In fact the League cannot continue an effective existence and certainly cannot conduct classes in economics at all unless its financial position can become secure. This requires a sum not much under £1,000 to wipe off all debt and leave a small working account. Members attention is especially directed to this vital matter. Unless something can be done to remedy the present position this may well be the last annual report to record any worthwhile achievement.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMISSION During the year the Local Government Commission which had been appointed by the Minister of Internal Affairs as a commission of enquiry into rating problems, made its report which from our point of view was, on the whole, very satisfactory. Among its recommendations were the following:

- 1. That there should be one universal system of rating applicable to both territorial and ad hoc local authorities.
- 2. That this system should be based on site values.
- 3. That the Valuation Department should revise site values every two years and capital values every six years.
- 4. That the local authorities at present rating on Annual Value be given the option of either a period of five years in which to make the change over to site value or seek special legislation to continue rating on the Annual Value until the ratepayers carry a poll for a change of rating to site value.

Publication of this report marked a mile stone in the progress of the movement towards land value taxation in the realm of local government. It would appear improbable that the Government will bring down legislation in line with the findings of the Commission. The Hon. S.W.Smith, Minister of Internal Affairs addressing the recent Municipal Conference said "It appears that the Commission's proposals are not generally acceptable to local authorities am it might be necessary to find some other answer to the difficult and important question."

The League submitted evidence to the Commission on three separate

occasions and there is no doubt that this evidence had a definite influence on the report of the Commission.

AUCKLAND - SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RATING a special committee to enquire into rating matters. The Committee reported in July 1956. The subject of the investigation was "The best system of rating suitable to Auckland's needs". The findings of the committee were that a change to rating on the Unimproved Value would be greatly to the advantage of the city in that it would reduce the tendency to city sprawl and would stimulate the development of the central decadent areas. The report received wide publicity in Auckland and will undoubtedly bear fruit in time.

During the recent mayoral election campaign the Labour candidate, Mr.J.Stewart, came out in favour of rating on the Unimproved Value. Dr.V.J.Chapman, the chairman of the council sub-committee that reported to the council, is continuing his interest in the matter and we feel sure that in time a rating poll will be organised in Aucklend.
