Since returning from Cambridge we have heard from Madame Touneau of the death of Albert Toubeau. We now have no representative of the IU in France.

Various resolutions were moved and lost, but it was agreed to alter the Declaration of Human Rights leaflet to the following wording:

At the foot of page 1:

We therefore advocate: That the equal right to land be secured by requiring of all landholders a payment to society approximating the full rental value of the land held whether it be used or not and excluding the value of the improvements thereon: and that such payment, national and municipal, be based on a valuation showing the true rental value of the land, this valuation being made public and being kept up to date by periodic revision.

That such payment be construed to be the rightful and sufficient public revenue for all levels of government."

The Accounts of the International Union showed it to be in a pretty healthy state with about \$4,000 which could be committed to some form of international activity. Members present were asked to suggest to the Executive Committee what forms this activity might take.

When discussing the venue of the Conference after Vancouver, it was pointed out that 1989 was the 150th anniversary of Henry George's birth and that therefore it would be appropriate to hold the next but one Conference in 1989 in Philadelphia. In the Executive meeting which followed later in the week, when the various suggestions were talked over, it was agreed that Philadelphia in 1989 should be the venue after Canada, and that the Conference be held in conjunction with the American schools' conference for that year.

Subsequent discussion revealed that it could be possible to hold the conference over the period of George's actual birthday, September 2nd (a Saturday in 1989), giving the occasion the maximum opportunity for propaganda. If the period of the joint conference were extended from, say, Saturday August 26th to Tuesday morning September 5th (the weekend of Saturday 2nd September to Monday 4th September will be a public holiday time in the US) this would allow for publicity for the anniversary celebrations and should give ample time for both the IU and the Schools to fit in their papers and reports.

Your Executive decided to take out 400 subscriptions to Land and Liberty at a cost of £2,000 for a year - the subscriptions to be sent to whoever members thought would usefully benefit from them. We therefore ask you all, if there are some local or national figures in your country whom you would like to influence, to let us have names and addresses so that Land and Liberty can be sent to them.

The Canadian Conference Committee reported on plans for the Vancouver conference. Accommodation, some basic and some more luxurious, has been reserved for us at the University of British Columbia and plans are afoot for a stimulating programme. As 1986 will be the International Union's Diamond Jubilee year, we hope that a great many of you will be with us to celebrate that event. More information, as we receive it, will be sent to you from time to time, either via your Land and Liberty envelope (this gives the IU a free postal service since the majority of members are also subscribers to the journal), or the Georgist Journal, whichever is nearer its date of distribution at the time
