

Wellington Hall



Due to the continuing uncertainty in the Middle East and our members' lukewarm reception of the suggestion of Brighton as an alternative site, it has now been decided that the 1991 conference should be held in London.

Accordingly, space has been reserved at Wellington Hall, one of the Halls of Residence for King's College in the University of London, which is within three minutes walking distance of the London office at Vauxhall Bridge Road.

The Hall is pleasantly situated, facing the playing fields in Vincent Square. It is warm and comfortable, carpeted throughout, with single and double rooms, all with washbasin and some on the ground floor. There is no lift. There are showers and lavatories for men and women on each floor except the ground floor, where only one set serves the few rooms and is used by both sexes.

The lecture room has considerable character; there is a bar, a TV room, and several small lounge areas away from the Bar. Other amenities include a laundry room with iron and ironing board, kitchens on each floor with oven, refrigerator and kettle (but bring your own mugs and cooking utensils if you will need them,) and telephones (coin and card) available at all times. There are NO car parking spaces. The area has short term meters and cars are liable to be clamped if unlawfully parked.

Within half a mile of the Hall are the Tate Gallery, Westminster Abbey and Cathedral, Buckingham Palace and St James' Park. There is public transport of all kinds to all directions. We will not be planning any activities other than the conference sessions and the Banquet, enabling all participants to choose for themselves how to fill in their spare time. The evening meal will be taken early so that theatre and cinema lovers can get to performances in time.



We have sleeping accommodation reserved for six nights from Thursday night, 21st March to Tuesday night, 26th March. Registration will be from 3p.m. on Thursday and plenary sessions will take place all day Friday, Monday and Tuesday, and in the mornings of Saturday, Sunday and Wednesday. The first meal will be dinner on Thursday and the last meal will be lunch on Wednesday. A Banquet will be held at another location on Saturday night and no meal will be provided on Sunday evening (there are a number of restaurants at all price levels within a short distance, but most people will be far away on that evening!) Meals, apart from Saturday and Sunday evening,

will be taken in the dining room. English breakfast, a buffet lunch and a three course dinner will be served.

The major theme - "War & Peace" - is appropriate for a conference that was displaced from its original venue because of the prospect of war in the Middle East. Localised wars with conventional weapons (Iraq's President Hussein willing) will play an increasing role in determining political relations between nations during the 1990's.

The relevance of the Georgist analysis to territorial conflicts will be subjected to severe testing by authors - some of them distinguished academics - who draw their case studies from around the world. * How can the Muslim-Jew dispute over land be resolved to everyone's satisfaction? * How can the anxieties of the whites, who control most of the land in South Africa, be addressed, while extending equal rights to blacks? Imaginative application of the Georgist fiscal policy provides exciting solutions to both civil and international conflicts.

This conference promises to be one of the most stimulating - and important - ever organised by the International Union.
