I would refer to the No. 32 Summer 1981 issue of the Georgist journals and am very proud to have been awarded the acolade of the guest editorial in that issue. I was most particularly interested in the report of the annual conference of the Georgist organisations held in New Hampshire and with especial respect to the spirit of the Council of Georgist Organisations in maintaining communications among Georgist groups and individuals.

I am becoming more and more of the opinion that it is imperative that a full time professional dedicated input at the highest level is now imperative if the Georgian doctrine is to achieve any value on the world scene.

Towards this end I am preparing counsel to yourself and other world scattered Georgian organisations to see if financial strengthening of the movement ideological rectification and dedicated personal involvement can be stimulated within the next few years so as to spread the message extensively, intensively and with maximum affect on the political and economic scene of the world crisis.

Imperative among the requirements for such an upgrading of the Georgian programme must be the identification of financial resources and the mobilising of financial grants from wherever possible to speed the expansion of the work. Foremost among the ways to ensure acceptance of the message is by professional application of media expertise and this must be paid for.
