The point I'm trying to make and I hope I am not overdoing it, is that good ideas don't always need such labels and when the labels emerge they often do a dis-service. We never hear about Lincolnism, or Kennedyism, Keyensian, yes, but not Washingtonism. Anyway I'm glad you heard Jeff out and I hope we can hear about bigger more adaptable concepts like economic justice, etc. rather than the same old isms or ists. The other dis-service that it does is that too many people talk about two camps *****ists and non-*****ists, it separates rather than unifies, invites conflict rather than harmony. Okay I've said it. I'll try to shut-up on this subject for now and please don't feel obligated to address this issue, I just wanted to express myself and I appologize if I sound like I'm grinding an axe.

Now on to the work at hand. In spite of all my comments, our group would like to be included in your Council of Geo (Economic Justice) Organizations if you will have us.
