Jeff here,

thanking you for the letters of November 1 and 8. Thanks, too, for the space in the <u>Georgist Journal</u>. Of course, more would've pleased me, as it undoubtedly would've the Georgists in Fairhope, Ireland, and Argentina. This underscores my point; no action got enough play (i say), only essaying did. Because the real work is so hard, we seem to make do with philosophizing with each other, instead of taking action or even discussing action. E.g., you didn't run the info you requested on who in Nicaragua i met with. How these contacts could further our movement might have made interesting reading. My bias, obviously, is emphasizing constantly, WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

Thanks, too, for the articles from The New York Times. Re the one about the Sandinistans arming themselves to the teeth with Soviet helicopters, i'm not sure what conclusion i'm supposed to draw. Nevertheless, it interested me and saddened me that so many have so much faith in violence.

The other article, by Leiken, about peace in Nicaragua on our terms, their surrender, angered me, especially since it's supposed to be the balanced or objective view. He failed to reconcile, among many other failures, the facts that if the Sandinistas are unpopular, how can they arm the populace? The truth is, the Sandinistas are popular enough with the masses, but not with the institutions - high clergy of the Church, rich men of bigger businesses, etc. Young idealists, of course, are quite loyal.

Furthermore, Leiken failed to mention that the CIA pays internal opponents to the Sandinistas (besides the external contras). Since Hector Cruz is offered a better deal from the CIA, is that the source of his opposition and not the alleged (tho probable) mistreatment by Sandinistas? Until the U.S. quits interfering, we'll never know.

Leiken failed to mention that the civil rights the Sandinistas

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took away were given, or won, by the Sandinistas in the first place (altho this certainly does not excuse their wartime emergency measures) from the U.S. puppet, dictator Somoza.

What behavior is the true Sandinista behavior? As they are in power during war? Or in power during peace? (See enclosed.) Leiken also failed to mention that the Sandinistas did not need reforming until we put their backs to the wall. Again, it's like slapping somebody then saying, "i don't like this guy; he's always so mad". Would the Sandinistas be peaceful without the U.S. aggressive presence? We won't know until our masters withdraw.

How would we look if we judged the U.S. by the standards we impose upon the Sandinistas? Should your government, the U.S., be judged by Nisei concentration camps, Hiroshima, Kent State, My Lai, etc., etc.? Who are we to tell the Sandinistas how to behave? And why should the Sandinistas listen to us? Why would anyone listen to those who say, "do my way or die"?

I believe power corrupts universally. As the most powerful state, the U.S. is thus the most corrupt (compared to its rhetoric, its potential to do good, and its paranoic reasons for doing evil). As the Sandinistas acquire power, which the U.S. forces them to do to defend their revolution, they are becoming corrupt, too.

If the Sandinistas continue toward the kind of dictatorship that displeases capitalists, i.e., a "people's republic" rather than a capitalist dictatorship, will we have erred by forcing the U.S. to withdraw from Nicaragua? I think not. Violence, especially against innocent civilians, is no way to win peace, justice, etc.

The only way to counter the state, any state, i.e. organized violence, is with the brotherhood, some fraternal/sororal order, i.e. organized peace - tax resistance, civil disobedience, alternative currencies, self-reliant economies, etc. This takes courage and dedication and giving no quarter to the state, which is why i'm so tough on my fellow Georgists. "Skepticism about the Sandinistas doesn't necessarily mean either indifference to Nicaragua or a desire to kill them", but it results in the same. As long as you and other good Americans use your skepticism to justify doing nothing to stop your masters, the U.S. Government, from funding the slaughter, the bloodshed will go on.

I have checked Jim Busey's section on Nicaragua in his new "Political Guide to Latin America" and want to finish reading the

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whole thing. He writes well (as do you) and is well informed (as are you and so many Georgists). Yet he, as do so many Georgists, includes anti-Marxism with pro-Georgism, which works, i think, to the detriment of our movement. This saddens me. Our trip to Nicaragua would be greatly enhanced by his estimable presence.

Thanks, too, for the offer to continue coverage of this trip in the \underline{GJ} as it develops. And thanks for bringing to my attention the map books by \underline{Geo} .
