STUDY CLASSES

ROYAL YORK MEETING: The second meeting at the Royal York, on Tuesday February the 4th, showed continued interest in the Henry George School of Social Science. Mr. Patterson opened the meeting: Mr. Owens conducted the class. There were thirty-seven persons present and ten more students enrolled at the close of the evening. Five purchased copies of the textbook, "Progress and Poverty," some already had copies.

Many of those present, who had not read the assigned section of "Progress and Poverty," showed their interest in the subject by asking questions and a very lively discussion arose on some points. Indeed, it was impossible to answer all questions fully as so much ground had to be covered in the limited space of two hours.

To give each student a better chance of thrashing out his difficulties (and also to make attendance more convenient for those living in different parts of Toronto) the class was divided into two groups.
