STUDY CLASSES

THANKS: We owe our very best thanks to Mr. John Lawrence Monroe and the original Henry George School of Social Science for sending us free all the supplies to launch our Extension Classes here. Mr. Monroe's advice and encouragement were as welcome as the assignment sheets and enrollment cards. It is much easier to follow a trail if others have blazed it ahead.

PROGRESS: Our classes are all doing good work. The Northern Class, led by Mr. Patterson, meets at his home, 104 Glengowan Road. This class, formed for the convenience of people living in the northern end of Toronto, usually has an attendance of 10 members. The Central Class, meeting under the leadership of Mr. Owens at 69 Bloor St. East, draws its members from the rest of the city. Its attendance varies from 14 to 15. These two classes meet every Tuesday at 8 P. M.

Both leaders report the significant fact that students have no desire to hurry off at the end of the evening's work; instead, they linger to ask questions or argue over the points raised during the session. This shows that both teachers are making their students think. The experience of the New York School shows that a thinking student usually becomes a confirmed Single Taxer by the end of the course. More power to our teachers' elbows (and tongues) and may their classes never grow less!
