My Dear Sir:--

I write to advise you that the Henry George Lecture Association has made arrangements with Mr. John Z. White of Chicago, Ill., to deliver a number of addresses in this City and vicinity on the Henry George Economics, during the following month.

I am now arranging the appointments for Mr. White and would like very much indeed to have him address your organization, on any evening in which you can arrange to give him thirty minutes or more time. If any part of your program provides for a lecture on a general subject, I am confident that you will be greatly entertained with Mr. White's presentation. His usual plan is to present an outline of his subject in about thirty or forty minutes and to then answer questions from the audience for thirty or forty minutes longer. Although the question part is often the most interesting and instructive it can be limited or omitted.

Mr. White has, since the 28th of September, 1903, when he began this engagement, addressed more than 150 of the largest business associations, young men's clubs, connected with various churches, Labor Unions, Literary Societies, Women's Clubs, etc., in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Milwaukee, New Orleans, and other cities of the Central and Mississippi Valley States.

He comes to this city on the earnest invitation of a special committee of one hundred public spirited men, which are in part named on this letter head under the Advisory Committee.

Among the students of public questions in the Central States, Mr. White is regarded as one of the keenest and ablest men among American platform speakers.

Your organization will be under no expense whatever for this lecture. Our purpose in appearing before you is in carrying out our general plan to arouse the people to a greater interest in economic and social questions.

It is probably needless to say that the lecture will be absolutely non-political in a partisan sense.

I trust sincerely, that considering the importance at this time of stimulating the people to serious thought in civic problems that you will be able to find an open date for Mr. White in some department of your educational work.
