

An end to monopoly — in gov-
ernment, banking, land, patents,
mergers, trade unions, medicine.

Rational, humane laws. Prisons
abolished; replaced by fines,
with psychiatric treatment if
necessary.

SUGGESTED BOYCOTTS

TO AVOID PHYSICAL AND SPIRITUAL EXTINCTION

Assess full ground rent, without
exception, for ethical revenue
source, low improvement taxes,
an end to speculation. Choice of
sites at true rental value will en-
sure a surplus of safe employ-
ment, at wages equal to one's
production.

Government restitution for offi-
cial or private injuries. Polygraph
tests to be accepted as evidence.

All meat, poultry and eggs produced by "intensive farming." (Tortured animals, deprived of space, movement, fresh air, sunshine, a normal diet and activity, and poisoned by these lacks and by antibiotics, cancer-producing fattening agents; and in the case of poultry, kept working overtime, laying degenerated eggs, until worn out, then sold for its tasteless, degenerated meat) (See "Animal Machines.")

All meat and poultry slaughtered by inhumane methods.

All food not organically grown, free of pesticides, detrimental processing, and addi-
tives not definitely proven harmless.

All food in nondegradable containers; drinks in nonreturnable containers.

All furs. (Trapping, clubbing to death or skinning alive is cruel. Changes in ecological
balance are dangerous, and willingness to destroy life, to no purpose, is unwholesome.)

Rodeos. (Broncos and steers are made to buck by applying electric shock to sensitive
areas, or by a tight strap over the genitals. Calves are brutally thrown, and steers
may be dragged with their heads in the dirt, gouging out an eye.)

Bullfights, bloody or "bloodless." (In addition to the torture of the bulls, the
picador's horse may be ripped open, sewed up, and sent back for more.)

Cock fights and dog fights. (Obvious.) (See "Ordeal of the Animals.")

Horse racing. (The horses are all whipped, often doped, to kill pains of injuries. The
Tennessee Walking Horse steps high because his feet are terribly soled, torturing him.)

Animals in roadside carnivals and some zoos are given very poor care, and caging is cruel.

Abolish all private hunting. (Killing and torturing shouldn't be a sport. Two-thirds of
deer shot escape, and are in agony until they starve. Thousands of people are also shot.)

Pet stores. (Let animals enjoy natural habitat. Save resources. Reduce pollution.)

Refuse to participate in the enforcement of any sumptuary laws, as they are arbitrary
attempts to play God, and their violations cannot be proved to injure others.

Refuse to participate in prosecuting anyone liable to either the death sentence or
imprisonment - liable to anything more than reasonable restitution or a fine (or
psychiatric care, if necessary), with the amount checked by a philosophically compe-
tent reviewing board, with civil rights representation, and with polygraph tests
accepted as evidence of innocence, if requested.

Refuse to serve as policemen, unless exempt from carrying out unconstitutional orders
or enforcing sumptuary laws; and unless apprehension of suspects is to be accomplished
by the most peaceful means possible, checked with polygraph tests, accepted from those
apprehended, or tests of the police if those apprehended are incapacitated.

Refuse to serve as guards, doctors, nurses or chaplains, in jails or prisons, civilian
or military, unless they are in the process of being quickly phased out - and then only
if also in the capacity of officers of the court, obliged to report injustice of any
kind, with restitution assured.

Prisons should be abolished for at least four reasons: 1) Their main purpose is to prevent
deprived people from alleviating their poverty with necessary thievery. 2) They are
grossly discriminatory, as the power elite are guilty of the greatest crime, of creating
monopolies, depriving millions of the ability to work, and most of those working of the
equivalent of their production. The upper classes, as individuals or corporations, also
suffer little, if anything, from their many acknowledged crimes. 3) Prisons provide enor-
mous opportunities for almost unchecked power to exercise unjust sentencing, graft, sadism,
and neglect of various types - all highly injurious to prisoners, multiplying the evil
effect of caging and other completely unnatural conditions. 4) Prisons, through uncon-
stitutional laws, arbitrary interpretations and perjured testimony, provide a check by

the powerful, upon all those trying to improve anything. The absence of prisons would compel us to have a government based upon justice and reason. Rational laws and rational officials would be the greatest force for law and order.

Refuse to serve in the military, in any capacity, except when located in the United States or nearby waters, or on disaster relief; and then only as volunteers, fed an organically nutritious diet, with sexual relations permitted with wives, husbands or other consenting partners, to the extent possible. (We have the capacity to destroy any potential opponent from our own mainland, and any extension of our military power is for exploitation, as in Latin America, southeast Asia and elsewhere.)

Refuse to serve as doctors, nurses or chaplains in private hospitals, charity hospitals, veterans hospitals or nursing homes, unless treatment is supervised by independent private organizations, including civil rights groups, and with a diet approved for each individual by experts in organic foods and vitamins.

Refuse to approve any bond issue of any government unit, or extension of the national debt, until the government first collects its most ethical source of revenue, the full assessment of ground rent, estimated at \$60 to \$90 billion - a value created entirely by community growth, and therefore properly belonging to the community. The assessment would have the additional enormous advantage of eliminating the basis for more than a nominal selling price to land (the capitalization of the unassessed value), and so ending speculation and hoarding, holding for an expected higher selling price, with further development of the community. Every business and residential site, urban or rural, would then be available at its true rental value, paid either as rent to the landholder, or as rent by the landholder to the community. (Called a land value tax, or assessment) The equalization of annual site costs for all land of the same value would open up unlimited opportunities, the ample selection enabling everyone, for the first time, to obtain the equivalent of his production, his scientific, true wage, without coercion. Adjustments could be made to create a peaceful, healthful, non-polluting, equitable, humanitarian society, without surplus, overpaid government employees, without exploiting underdeveloped countries, with no group in this country exploiting the remainder of the public; and with no one obliged to engage in highly dangerous or unhealthful work.

Oppose new nuclear plants and the continuance of existing ones, as being extremely dangerous to both humans and the ecology.

Oppose new dams and consider the destruction of existing ones, as being menace to the ecology of the area, a scenic disaster, a negligible power plant, a developer of increasingly saline irrigation projects, salty drinking water - a make-work boondoggle. Oppose all so-called anti-poverty programs. Senator Ribicoff says that the saving would provide every poor family of four with \$ 4800 a year. They now provide only graft. A genuine anti-poverty program would be the full assessment of ground rent, which would provide a surplus of work. The demand for labor would ensure training on the job.

Oppose government spending for sadistic and useless experiments on animals. Insist that all government and industrial projects, and all college and lower grade projects involving experiments on animals be checked adequately by doctors, veterinarians and humane societies, as to the usefulness of the project, all things considered, including the pain to the animals, the possibility of minimizing or eliminating the pain, the ending of duplicate experiments, insurance against operating on stolen pets, and a check on a claim of usefulness by operating on one's own pet.

Reject all but the least material consuming and least polluting autos. Walk, bicycle, use car pools or public transportation.

Avoid innumerable unneeded power or material consuming products, which add nothing to our health or pleasure, or to our appearance. Avoid deliveries by mail or from stores, where items could as well be picked up. Boycott trivial or reactionary books, magazines, radio and TV programs, movies, plays and phonograph records, to discourage such production. What can't be obtained by persuasion or votes may be obtained by boycotts. Polygraph tests may be used for unresolved differences.
